

Roosevelt Timeline

- May 2015
 - HSR Architects identified 14 buildings to address safety and security one of which was Roosevelt
- January 4, 2016
 - “Demographic Trends and Facilities recommends a Capital Referendum be considered by the Board with priority given to improvements to South, **possibly Roosevelt**, and then other maintenance items deemed a priority by facilities administration, look at open enrollment, closing schools to intra-district transfers, and implement overflow policies as ways to alleviate overcrowding in the elementary schools.”
- April 18, 2016
 - Demo & Trends annual Report included
 - “For the long term, the committee recommends that the board commission an architectural study to determine the best of course of action to resolve identified issues at Roosevelt Elementary, by building a new school, or renovating the existing structure.”
 - “For the short term, the committee recommends that the board not change school boundaries at this time until it is determined what is going to happen long term based on the architectural study. Until then, we recommend that the district closely monitor kindergarten enrollment at Roosevelt, and attempt to keep that enrollment at a maximum of 50 students per year by offering voluntary alternate school options.”
- May 2, 2016
 - The School Board approved HSR Architects to complete an evaluation of Roosevelt Elementary School and bring their recommendation to the School Board
- August 30, 2016
 - Received HSR Architect Report with three options
 - Option 1 – Remodel existing building on same property
 - Option 2 – Build a new building on the same property
 - Option 3 – Build a new building on a different property
- September 15, 2016
 - Demo & Trends reviewed the report to determine which of the three options would be best for the District
- January 12, 2017
 - Demo & Trends voted to bring Option 2 to the School Board
- May 15, 2017
 - Demo & Trends brought recommendation of Option 2 to the School Board
 - Minutes:
 - “The committee recommended short and long-term solutions for Roosevelt Elementary School. The short-term solution was implemented this past fall which allowed flexible boundaries at Roosevelt. This seems to be working and could be a model used in the future when dealing with overcrowding at other schools. The committee recommended that flexible boundaries be used again next year at Roosevelt and proposed an option to build a new building on the same property at Roosevelt. Facility needs at South Middle School were also discussed and if a building referendum goes forward when the District’s debt drops off in 2021, **perhaps Roosevelt could be included in that referendum.**”
 - No Board action was taken at this time
