Our staff want to thank our parents for helping in our efforts to ensure that students are respectful, ready, and responsible.

To ensure that we have all students prepared and learning at high levels, we need to have the correct behavior management strategies in place. Our staff have common expectations at each grade level and review these on an ongoing basis. Furthermore, to reinforce these behavior expectations, our admin team recently spoke to all of our students about expectations moving forward.

We covered the following ...

Hallway Expectations, Being on Time, Restroom Reminders, Being Nice to Substitutes, Classroom Behaviors, Lunchroom Expectations, After-School Activities, Cell Phone Reminders, Physical Aggression Zero Tolerance, Staying Engaged, and Utilizing Falcon Time.

Additionally, please take some time over the next few days to celebrate your student(s). Overall, our student body has reacted very well to our system changes. In fact, over 85% of our students have not had a MAJOR behavior referral, and only 9% of our students have had more than one Major referral. This is really great news.

Finally, we are officially in construction, and we would like to apologize for the inconvenience. Our staff have been remarkable and very flexible with learning spaces. We appreciate them and we appreciate the students and parents for your flexibility as well. Please be reminded that we will try to update you as much as possible along the way. Ultimately, we have A LOT of projects going on, and you'll start to see several areas get "changed" over the next two years. We hope to have a completion date of Fall 2025.

Keep Your Child On Track in Middle and High School: Pay Attention to Attendance

Showing up for school has a huge impact on a student's academic success. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school every day and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and on the job.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Students should miss no more than 9 days of school each year to stay engaged, successful and on track to graduation.
- Frequent absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, dealing with a bully or facing some other difficulty.
- By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- · By 9th grade, attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- Missing 10%, or 2 days a month, over the course of the school year, can affect a student's academic success.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

Make school attendance a priority

- Talk about the importance of showing up to school every day.
- Help your children maintain daily routines, such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep.
- Try not to schedule dental and non-urgent related medical appointments during the school day.
- Keep your student healthy, and if you are concerned about Covid-19, call your school for advice.
- If your children must stay home because they are sick, make sure they have asked teachers for resources and materials to make up for the missed learning time in the classroom.

Help your teen stay engaged

- Find out if your children feel engaged by their classes, and feel safe from bullies and other threats.
- Make sure your teens are not missing class because of challenges with behavioral issues or school discipline policies. If any of these are problems, contact the school and work with them to find a solution.
- Monitor you teen's academic progress and seek help from teachers or tutors when necessary. Make sure teachers know how to contact you.
- Stay on top of your child's social contacts. Peer pressure can lead to skipping school, while students without many friends can feel isolated.
- Encourage your child to join meaningful after-school activities, including sports and clubs.
- · Notice and support your students if they are showing signs of anxiety.

Communicate with the school

- Know the school's attendance policy incentives and penalties.
- Check on your child's attendance to be sure absences are not adding up.
- Seek help from school staff, other parents, or community agencies if you need support.
